






# Did gou know

A square piece of paper.


A piece of string or ribbon.

A hole punch or scissors.

Markers.









Fold your paper in half. Fold this rectangle in half once more. When you unfold your paper it will be split into quarters.






Fold the bottom edge of your paper up to the halfway mark.




Take one corner and fold it diagonally. There should be a small triangle hanging over your paper.





Repeat for the other side.







Fold the top of your paper down along the halfway mark.








Fold the bottom edge of the paper up, making your crease 1/4 of the way down the paper.










Fold the top right corner down diagonally until it touches the original halfway mark.



Flip your paper over and decorate your car!

## CAR COOKIES

Total time: Approx. 1 hour 45 minutes

Age: 12+ or any age with adult supervision



#### Step 1: Make your cookie cutter.

Estimated time: 30 minutes



- A cereal box.
- A marker.
- Paper.
- Scissors.
- Paperclips.
- Masking tape.







Note: Your cookie cutter will start to become wet and lose its shape as you use it. Plan to use one cookie cutter per batch of cookies!



## Step 1: Make your cookie cutter.

#### How To:


Cut the cereal box into strips about one inch wide and as long as possible.







Use the paper and marker to draw a simple car shape.








#### Step 1: Make your cookie cutter.

Bend and fold a cardboard strip into the car shape, using your drawing as a guide.



If you're having trouble bending the cardboard, unfold some paperclips and use them to help make your car shape!



Fasten the paperclips in place with masking tape.

Trim any extra cardboard. Then, tape the ends of the cardboard strip together.





Ta-da! You have a custom car shaped cookie cutter!








#### Step 2: Make your cookies.

Estimated time: 15 minutes for mixing; 30 minutes for chilling.

#### Ingredients for Dough:





- 2 eggs.
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract.
- 2 1/2 cups flour.
- 1 teaspoon baking powder.
- 1/4 teaspoon salt.



#### How To:

- 1. Cream together room temperature butter and sugar.
- 2. Beat in eggs and vanilla.
- 3. Stir in flour, baking powder, and salt.
- 4. Chill for 30 minutes.
- 5. Roll out the dough until about 1 cm thick.
- 6. Cut the dough using your cookie cutter.
- 7. Place on a parchment lined baking sheet, evenly spaced.
- 8. Bake at 400 degrees for 15 minutes, or until edges are golden brown.





#### Step 3: Decorate your cookies.

Estimated time: 30 minutes.



#### Ingredients for Icing:



- 1 cup icing sugar.
- 2 to 3 tablespoons milk.
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract.
- Food colouring.

#### How To:

- 1. Combine the icing sugar, milk, and vanilla extract. Stir until smooth.
- 2. Add a few drops of food colouring to the icing. Start with less you can always add more!
- 3. Use a butter knife to spread the icing on **fully cooled** cookies.
- 4. Allow the icing to set.
- 5. Enjoy!



#### Tip:

- Adding more milk creates a thinner icing.
- Adding more sugar creates a thicker icing.
